HUNTER SAFETY EDUCATION IS CELEBRATING 35 YEARS

Over the past 35 years, trained and dedicated volunteers have enriched the lives of Illinois youth interested in pursuing a time honored tradition...the shooting sports. Today's volunteer training force consists of nearly 1,200 men and women who have trained and certified more than 500,000 students in the Illinois Hunter Safety Education Program.

The current course structure has been in place for 35 years, although some form of hunter safety education has existed since March 1959. Throughout the years, the training program has evolved from volunteer participation and using National Rifle Association materials to a program offered through the Illinois school system to the most recent addition to the course...the option of combining an online self study phase with a field day. Today, the growth of technology help hunter safety education programs enhance a student's learning experience.

What keeps a volunteer active after logging in more than 35 years of service and witnessing an ever changing audience and method for teaching? According to Jimmy Walker of Catlin, one of the first volunteers recruited as an Illinois hunter safety education instructor in 1976, *“it's the students I taught in the 1970s and 1980s that approach me and say, ‘I know what you did for me and I want you to do the same for my children.’”*

JANUARY IS THE TIME TO SIGN UP FOR EARTH DAY IN THE PARKS

"**Earth Day in the Parks** is an event to promote stewardship of our natural resources by Illinois school children. During April and May, students and their teachers from throughout Illinois will come to participating Illinois state parks to take part in natural resources stewardship activities such as: planting native trees and wildflowers; building and installing nesting/roosting boxes; removing invasive exotic species; and building brush piles for wildlife."

THE GIFT YOU CAN GIVE TO THE ILLINOIS WILDLIFE PRESERVATION FUND

If you are required to file a State of Illinois income tax return, you may contribute to the Illinois Wildlife Preservation Fund!

Here's How It Works

State the amount (not less than \$1) you wish to donate on the return under Section 10 (Donations).

The amount of the donation will be deducted from your tax refund (if you are due a refund) or will be added to the amount of tax owed. All donations are tax deductible.

Your Donation works in hundreds of ways!

All donations are used to fund projects awarded under the Illinois Wildlife Preservation Fund.

Survival of Illinois' native plants and animals is an ever growing challenge as important habitats are lost or degraded. Your contribution will pay for projects to help restore and manage habitats, monitor rare species, conduct research to help plan the recovery of endangered species, and educate Illinoisans about the values of our native species.

Your contribution will help preserve and manage state parks throughout Illinois, which are set aside to protect scenic areas and areas of important historic or cultural significance. State parks also offer diverse recreational opportunities such as camping, boating, hunting, fishing and equestrian trails.

QUESTION FOR THIS MONTH: We have started a Friends Group, but still only have a handful of members. How do we increase our membership of committed and active volunteers?

ANSWER FROM GOOSE LAKE PRAIRIE PARTNERS, INC.: "In our group just this year, we added about 10 new members. One thing that helped our group was a member was willing to **talk one on one to visitors** at events and to purchasers of raffle tickets. He informed them about our group and invited them to join. Many said they had been thinking about the park and they thought they were ready to lend a hand...After he got a 'yes', he followed up with packets of our papers and lists of our projects, copies of newsletter, etc. after the one on one talk. Of these new members, we have four new weekend workers to keep the Center open; a new Holiday Party Chair; and a new Secretary!

You need a **Membership Recruitment Chair**. If a group doesn't have a recruiter.....it is hard to get new members. We have a list of names and email addresses from the visitor's center sign in book. I send out updates on events and announce that a new newsletter is on the desk in the center and on our website. This list is now about 400 names.

To keep members committed and active, we share information among our members and friends on a **monthly basis**, announcing specific friend meetings, programs and such.

Get families involved. Junior members sign up to volunteer with their family in the center on weekends. They are handy for making jewelry to sell in the gift shop and one of them is weaving rugs for the gift shop. Each year we decorate the Christmas tree with **homemade ornaments**. Some members wear 1830 period dress. Hot Apple cider and homemade cookies were served. Children and adults made holiday ornaments, one to hang on our tree and **one to take home** with them. I hope this helps others." **Susie Johnson, President**

If your group has resources, you may want to initiate a marketing campaign!

ANSWER FROM FRANKLIN GROVE CREEK PRESERVATION AREA COMMITTEE: "We are working with a non profit consultant, the USPS and a commercial printing company to create **a newsletter and do a saturation advertising campaign** to the four counties around the Franklin Creek Grist Mill (about 14k households). It will have basically the same information that is on the website, but will make a big push for membership in our organization.

We have never had a marketing plan or membership program before. We are trying to get the Franklin Grove Creek Preservation Area Committee on a sound, stable financial situation.

The mailing is going to be an **eight page (8 1/2"x11") color newsprint newspaper ad supplement** type document, which will cost us only about \$.09 each (in our volume). It will be printed by the **local newspaper**. With declining readership, they are very aggressive and competitive in commercial printing. We are also using a new **USPS** product called "**Every Door Direct Mail Bulk Mail**" which is aimed at small retail businesses, but works great for non profits too. It will cost us about \$.09 each to mail each document. You can target every household in as small an area as an individual postman route to as large as or more zip codes. The USPS is also very aggressive and responsive to new business opportunities. Our entire cost is going to be about \$.18 each, so it is very reasonable price wise."
