- Social Host Law Background – Prevention First
- Illinois Social Host Law - Drug or Alcohol Impaired Minor Responsibility Act (DAIMRA) - ILCC

Studies indicate that social host laws are among the most effective and recommended ways to reduce underage drinking. Social host liability laws hold individuals who knowingly provide or allow the use of alcohol by minors or intoxicated adults liable for resulting property damage, injury, death or violation fines. <https://www.prevention.org/>

---


Social Access is when youth obtain the product at parties, from their parents (with or without permission), or from a friend/sibling.




Perceived Access: If you wanted to get beer, wine, or hard liquor how easy would it be for you to get some?



Would you get caught by your parents if you go to a party where alcohol is served?





# Why Social Host Ordinances?

---



Holds host accountable: provides law enforcement with tools to address parties where alcohol is served to youth.



Provides cost recovery fines: fines collected can be used for law enforcement efforts as well as prevention efforts by coalitions.



Decrease social access: sends a powerful message that underage drinking parties are not acceptable.
