Post sample results to a map and IDOA web site.</p>
<b>Goals</b>	<p>Ensure that there are no deaths as a result of anhydrous ammonia releases and achieve a five percent reduction in nurse tank violations and zero roadside releases due to lack of proper use of safety equipment.</p> <p>Protect the consumer through by preventing adulteration of feed and/or food due to the introduction of a mycotoxin and through implementation of the FDA mandate of the Animal Feed Program Regulatory Program Standards (AFRPS). This will include risk assessment of all facilities in the state and regular audits of the field inspections and reports generated.</p> <p>Ensure GMP (Good Manufacturing Practices) inspections to protect the consumer from the introduction of illegal residues into feed and possibly into the food supply.</p> <p>Maintain consumer confidence that the feed items they purchase meet the label guarantees. For livestock producers, safe feed free of illegal residues. For pet owners rely on a safe feed for their animals.</p>
