2 MR. ROATE: Good morning. My name is  
3 George Roate. I'm with the Illinois Department of  
4 Public Health.

5 I am accompanied today by Mr. Ron Eaker,  
6 Board Member from the Illinois Health Facilities and  
7 Services Review Board.

8 MR. EAKER: Thank you, George.

9 I just want to make a brief comment in  
10 stating the history of my presence today.

11 When the legislature reinstated the  
12 Board, part of the provision was that once the Board  
13 reached full contingency that a Board Member should be  
14 present at hearings, not to ask questions or to make  
15 comments, but simply to observe and get the feel or  
16 the mood of those presenting. That's why I'm here  
17 today. And, therefore, you won't have to hear any  
18 more from me.

19 MR. ROATE: Thank you, Mr. Eaker.

20 We're here to conduct a public hearing on  
21 the proposed project known as Project 11-039, Provena  
22 United Samaritans Medical Center, Danville, and the  
23 applicants' proposal to transfer ownership of Provena  
24 United Samaritans Medical Center in Danville. As per

1 the rules of the Illinois Health Facilities and  
2 Services Review Board, I would like to read the legal  
3 notice into the record.

4 In accordance with the requirements of the  
5 Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act, notice is  
6 given of receipt to transfer ownership of a hospital:  
7 Project 11-039, Provena United Samaritans Medical  
8 Center, Danville. The applicants are Provena  
9 Hospitals, Provena Health Resurrection -- or, Provena  
10 Health, Resurrection Health Care Corporation, and Cana  
11 Lakes Health Care. The applicants propose to transfer  
12 to Cana Lakes Health Care ownership of the 174-bed  
13 community hospital, located at 812 North Logan Street,  
14 Danville. Project cost: \$170,471,667.

15 A public hearing will take place pursuant  
16 to Part 1130.910. The hearing is scheduled for 10:00  
17 a.m. on Wednesday, August 17th, 2011, at the Danville  
18 Public Library, 319 North Vermilion Street, Danville,  
19 Illinois 61832. The public hearing is to be held by  
20 the Illinois Department of Public Health pursuant to  
21 the Illinois Health Facilities Planning Act. The  
22 hearing is open to the public and will afford an  
23 opportunity for parties with interest to present  
24 written and/or verbal comment relevant to the project.

1 All allegations or assertions should be relevant to  
2 the need for the proposed project and be supported  
3 with two copies of documentation or materials that are  
4 printed or typed on paper, 8 1/2 inches by 11 inches.  
5 Consideration by the State Board has been tentatively  
6 scheduled for the October 12th-13th, 2011, State Board  
7 meeting.

8 If you have not done so, please sign in  
9 using the appropriate registration forms. One form is  
10 for individuals who want to provide testimony in favor  
11 of the project. One form is for people to provide  
12 testimony who oppose the project. And the last form  
13 is for individuals to register their attendance who do  
14 not wish to testify.

15 To ensure that the Illinois Health  
16 Facilities and Services Review Board's public hearings  
17 protect the privacy and maintain the confidentiality  
18 of an individual's health information, covered  
19 entities, as defined by the Health Insurance  
20 Portability Act of 1996, such as facilities, hospital  
21 providers, health plans, and health care  
22 clearinghouses, submitting oral or written testimony  
23 that discloses the protected health information of  
24 individuals shall have a valid written authorization

1 from that individual. The authorization shall allow  
2 the covered entity to share the individual's protected  
3 health information at this hearing.

4 Those of you who came with prepared text  
5 for your presentation may choose to submit that text  
6 without giving testimony. However, if you are giving  
7 testimony, you will be called in the order in which  
8 you signed in. As per the legal notice, I would  
9 appreciate two copies of your testimony. When you  
10 make your presentation, please give the court reporter  
11 the spelling of your complete name. If there is a  
12 chief spokesperson for the applicant, we would like  
13 that individual to make the first presentation. The  
14 remaining testimony, as said before, will be taken in  
15 the order on the register. It is my understanding  
16 that we do have an order for speaking. Please hold  
17 your questions until all testimony is presented.

18 And our first individual scheduled to  
19 speak would be Sister Evelyn Varboncoeur.

20 SISTER VARBONCOEUR: Thank you.

21 My name is Sister Evelyn Varboncoeur.  
22 That's E-v-e-l-y-n V-, as in Victor, a-r-b-, as in  
23 boy, o-n-c-o-e-u-r. Thank you.

24 I'm a member of the Servants of the Holy

1 Heart of Mary religious community. And I'm speaking  
2 today on behalf of the Member Body of Provena Health,  
3 and this includes the Franciscan Sisters of the Sacred  
4 Heart, the Servants of the Holy Heart of Mary, the  
5 Sisters of Mercy of the Americas, and on behalf of the  
6 Sponsorship Council of Resurrection Health Care which  
7 includes the Sisters of the Holy Family of Nazareth  
8 and the Sisters of the Resurrection.

9 I'm very pleased to be here today to share  
10 with the community an overview of what is a very  
11 exciting chapter in the history of Provena United  
12 Samaritans Medical Center and for our health system as  
13 a whole. I would also express my sincere appreciation  
14 to the Illinois Health Facilities and Services Review  
15 Board for their efforts to enable this hearing to take  
16 place in a timely and organized fashion.

17 By way of background, Provena Health is a  
18 Catholic health system that includes six hospitals,  
19 including Provena United Samaritans, 16 long-term care  
20 and senior residential facilities, numerous clinics,  
21 five home health agencies, and other health-related  
22 activities operating in Illinois and Indiana. At the  
23 encouragement of Joseph Cardinal Bernardin, Provena  
24 Health came into being on December 1st, 1997, from a

1 human need to provide exceptional and compassionate  
2 health care services, and to be a sign of hope to all  
3 those in the communities it serves.

4 With a mission to build communities of  
5 healing and hope by compassionately responding to  
6 human need in the spirit of Jesus Christ, we have  
7 served our communities since our first hospitals  
8 opened their doors, as early as 1882.

9 From our very beginnings, we have been  
10 called to be much more than just a provider of health  
11 services. Rather, we are steeped in a culture that is  
12 committed to responding to the needs of those we are  
13 privileged to serve, delivering high-quality care that  
14 is accessible to all.

15 Today, I'm representing the five  
16 communities of women religious who, in faith and hope,  
17 seek the approval of the Illinois Health Facilities  
18 and Services Review Board to form a new Catholic  
19 health ministry to serve the citizens of Illinois  
20 through a merger of Provena Health and Resurrection  
21 Health Care Corporation.

22 As individual health systems, Provena  
23 Health and Resurrection Health Care have long provided  
24 compassionate healing to those in need. In keeping

1 with the true spirit of the courageous Sisters who  
2 came before us, ours have been ministries deeply  
3 focused on quality of care for all, regardless of  
4 one's ability to pay.

5 Now, as we anticipate health reform and  
6 the sweeping changes that will transform the delivery  
7 of care as we have come to know it, we are keenly  
8 aware that the key to sustaining and growing our  
9 person-centered mission lies in the strength of the  
10 enduring partnerships that we forge today.

11 Jointly rooted in the traditions of  
12 Catholic health care, the new ministry will be  
13 distinguished by an ability to deliver quality care  
14 across the continuum from a broad and complementary  
15 base of leading-edge locations and physician networks.  
16 From a foundation steeped in a shared heritage and set  
17 of values, the new ministry will give rise to an  
18 enormous potential to truly improve the well-being of  
19 generations of Illinoisans to come.

20 With a dedicated and talented combined  
21 team of nearly 5,000 physicians, supported by over  
22 22,000 employees, the new ministry will play an  
23 important role in the economic vitality of the  
24 communities in which we serve. Above all, our

1 partnership will remain true to the hallmarks of our  
2 Catholic identity: promoting and protecting the  
3 dignity of every individual from conception to death,  
4 caring for the poor and vulnerable, and properly  
5 stewarding our precious people and financial  
6 resources.

7           Finally, I would like to enter into the  
8 record a letter of support from His Excellency,  
9 Francis Cardinal George, Archbishop of Chicago. In  
10 his letter, he says, in part, "... I am grateful for  
11 the willingness of our state's premier Catholic  
12 providers to collaborate in order to meet the current  
13 challenges of health care. As they do now, the  
14 combined systems will operate without any restrictive  
15 admissions policies related to race, ethnic  
16 background, religion, payment source, or any other  
17 factor. The new system will continue to admit  
18 Medicare and Medicaid recipients and to care for those  
19 patients in need of charity care.... This merger has  
20 my full support...."

21           In conclusion, the combined Provena Health  
22 and Resurrection Health Care will strengthen and  
23 expand access to an exceptional tradition of quality  
24 care and will service millions of Illinois residents

1 who have come to know and to depend upon us for more  
2 than a century. On behalf of the women religious  
3 whose communities are sponsoring the proposal before  
4 you, we prayerfully request your approval.

5 And God bless you all and thank you all  
6 very much.

7 MR. ROATE: Next, the State Agency would  
8 like to call Michael Brown.

9 MR. BROWN: Good morning. My name is  
10 Michael, M-i-c-h-a-e-l, Brown, B-r-o-w-n.

11 Good morning and thank you for the  
12 opportunity to not only share with the public our  
13 goals for what we hope to achieve through a merger  
14 with the Provena Health System and the Resurrection  
15 Health Care System, but to also describe the benefits  
16 of the partnership for the people of Danville. My  
17 name is Mike Brown. I'm the President and CEO of  
18 Provena United Samaritans Medical Center and Provena  
19 Covenant Medical Center.

20 I would like to begin by reading a letter  
21 to the record from Guy Wiebking, the President and  
22 Chief Executive Officer of Provena Health, and Sandra  
23 Bruce, the President and Chief Executive Officer of  
24 Resurrection Health Care.

1           The letter's addressed to Ms. Courtney  
2 Avery, the Administrator, Illinois Health Facilities  
3 Planning and Services Review Board.

4           "Dear Ms. Avery,

5           In early July, after several months of  
6 talks among Sponsoring Congregations and between the  
7 Boards of Provena Health and Resurrection Health Care,  
8 as well as due diligence and discernment, we reached  
9 an agreement to come together to form a new patient,  
10 resident and family centered health ministry that will  
11 serve a large portion of Illinois. The size and scope  
12 of the new ministry will improve financial viability  
13 through a new structure that focuses on savings in  
14 corporate and administrative costs, while  
15 concentrating resources in our local health care  
16 ministries where care is provided. A new parent  
17 organization will oversee the existing Provena Health  
18 and Resurrection Health Care corporations.

19           Throughout the lengthy and thorough  
20 decision process, we came to realize our unique  
21 similarities. Our new ministry will support  
22 innovation and growth under health reform. The new  
23 ministry will be designed to excel at the patient,  
24 resident and family experience and provide

1 high-quality care and value across the continuum. In  
2 partnership with our physicians and employees, we are  
3 committed to building healthy communities by  
4 identifying community health needs and developing  
5 strategies to keep people healthy, as well as caring  
6 for the sick.

7 More than 4.5 million people live in the  
8 areas we serve. The combined ministry will encompass  
9 12 hospitals, 28 long-term care and senior residential  
10 facilities, more than 50 primary and specialty care  
11 clinics, six home health agencies, and the second  
12 largest behavioral health services program in the  
13 state. In addition, the ministry includes  
14 Resurrection University, a fully-accredited,  
15 not-for-profit, Catholic-based specialty school for  
16 health sciences. We will have nearly 5,000 physicians  
17 and more than 22,000 employees.

18 We would like to express our sincere  
19 gratitude to the Illinois Health Facilities and  
20 Services Review Board for giving us the opportunity to  
21 tell our story at today's public hearing. We respect  
22 and appreciate the conscientious work to make this  
23 series of hearings possible so that we, our  
24 supporters, stakeholders, and community partners have

1 the opportunity to speak about our plans.

2 Sincerely, Guy R. Wiebking, President and  
3 Chief Executive Officer, Provena Health; Sandra Bruce,  
4 President and Chief Executive Officer Resurrection  
5 Health Care."

6 For local hospitals like Provena United  
7 Samaritans and Provena Covenant, there are a number of  
8 excellent benefits to being part of a health system,  
9 and especially one that will be among the largest in  
10 the state. I want to draw your attention to a point  
11 in Mr. Wiebking's and Ms. Bruce's letter that states:  
12 "The size and scope of the new ministry will improve  
13 financial viability through a new structure that  
14 focuses on savings in corporate and administrative  
15 costs, while concentrating resources in our local  
16 health care ministries where care is provided."

17 Concentrating the resources where our care  
18 is provided -- our leaders get it. They know that  
19 success in health care is not derived from the  
20 corporate overhead structure, but rather by investing  
21 in the people who care for people in the communities  
22 in which we're privileged to serve.

23 As a member of Provena Health, our local  
24 hospitals in east central Illinois -- and ultimately,

1 our patients and employees -- have time and again  
2 benefited from the System's think global, act local  
3 approach. From technological enhancements that  
4 improve quality and patient safety to leading-edge  
5 diagnostics to patient and family-centered renovations  
6 and new programs, our local hospital ministries have  
7 grown in ways we never could have without the support  
8 and resources of a greater system.

9           As health care faces unprecedented  
10 changes, as we confront decreased reimbursements, as  
11 the need for charity care and financial assistance  
12 becomes greater than ever, and as our aging population  
13 tests the system as never before, hospital survival  
14 lies in what we at Provena call systemness. That's  
15 maximizing efficiency and cost savings by centralizing  
16 back-office type functions at a corporate level so  
17 that resources can be focused where they matter most  
18 -- in caring for our local communities.

19           We have some of that now as being a part  
20 of Provena, and we stand to gain more under the new  
21 organization. In fact, work is already under way to  
22 expand our charity care and financial assistance  
23 programs where the need is great due in large part to  
24 struggling economies.

1           There, to continue to ensure that we do  
2 not lose sight of what's important to our local  
3 communities, will be our wonderful and deeply  
4 dedicated local Boards of Directors which will operate  
5 as they currently do under the new structure. Our  
6 local Foundations will continue to do the same, with  
7 our locally raised dollars staying here, to make a  
8 difference in the lives of our friends and neighbors.

9           The partnership will also more strongly  
10 support our role as a leading employer in the markets  
11 we serve, with our employers -- employees enjoying the  
12 stability of being part of a larger health system,  
13 with competitive pay and benefits, career advancement  
14 opportunities, and a faith-based culture of diversity,  
15 camaraderie, respect, and compassion.

16           Above all, our merger will preserve and  
17 strengthen for generations to come the promise our  
18 Founding Sisters made here in Danville over a hundred  
19 years ago ... that through our ministry, all in need  
20 would have healing and hope in the spirit of Jesus  
21 Christ.

22           On behalf of the Provena family, I would  
23 like to thank all of you who have joined us today in  
24 person or in spirit for your support of our future and

1 to the Illinois Health Facilities Planning and  
2 Services Review Board for the opportunity to tell our  
3 story. Thank you.

4 MR. ROATE: Next, the State Agency would  
5 like to call Thomas Nehring.

6 MR. NEHRING: T-h-o-m-a-s N-e-h-r-i-n-g.

7 Good morning, everyone. My name is Tom  
8 Nehring, and I am the Senior -- System Senior Vice  
9 President of Mission Services for Provena Health. I'm  
10 here today in support of the merger of Provena Health  
11 and Resurrection Health Care.

12 In my role with Provena, I have been  
13 responsible for cultural integration of mission,  
14 vision, values, and Catholic ministry identity;  
15 community benefit; advocacy and government relations;  
16 clinical and organizational ethics; leadership  
17 development and spirituality and spiritual care  
18 services across our health system for the past nine  
19 years. And I'm proud to serve as a member of the  
20 Board of Directors of Provena United Samaritans  
21 Medical Center. Previous to joining Provena, I did  
22 similar work for ten years at Wheaton Franciscan  
23 Healthcare, another Catholic health system. During  
24 this time I have also worked on national committees

1 and boards involved with Catholic health care  
2 ministry.

3 In my career with Catholic health care, I  
4 have come to know that our ministry as a whole works  
5 to bring alive the Gospel vision of justice and peace.  
6 We answer God's call to foster healing, act with  
7 compassion, and promote wellness for all persons and  
8 communities, with special attention to our neighbors  
9 who are poor, underserved, and most vulnerable. By  
10 our service, we strive to transform hurt into hope.

11 For more than 125 years, Provena Health  
12 ministries have existed for the sole purpose of caring  
13 for all, regardless of their ability to pay. It is a  
14 commitment that is at the core of our mission: to  
15 build communities of healing and hope by  
16 compassionately responding to human need in the spirit  
17 of Jesus Christ.

18 It is how we concretely live out directive  
19 number 3 of the Ethical and Religious Directives for  
20 Catholic Health Care Services given to us by the  
21 Bishops of the United States: "In accord with its  
22 mission, Catholic health care should distinguish  
23 itself by service to and advocacy for those people  
24 whose social condition puts them at the margins of our

1 society and makes them particularly vulnerable to  
2 discrimination: the poor; the uninsured and the  
3 underinsured; children and the unborn; single parents;  
4 the elderly; those with incurable diseases and  
5 chemical dependencies; racial minorities; immigrants  
6 and refugees. In particular, the person with mental  
7 or physical disabilities, regardless of the cause or  
8 severity, must be treated as a unique person of  
9 incomparable worth, with the same right to life and to  
10 adequate health care as all other persons." This is  
11 what we strive to do.

12 Today, I must tell you that the needs of  
13 the poor and the marginalized are greater than ever.

14 Newly released figures detail that our  
15 services in 2010 resulted in a charitable impact upon  
16 our communities of more than \$186 million for Provena  
17 Health. Nearly 60 million of that was given away in  
18 free care at cost through charitable assistance, which  
19 totaled over \$35 million, and then bad debts, which  
20 equaled nearly \$25 million.

21 Sixty-two percent of that 186 million, or  
22 114.5 million, represented combined provisions of care  
23 not fully reimbursed from state and federal  
24 government's Medicaid and Medicare programs. In

1 addition, Provena contributed over 12 million in  
2 community benefit services, which are specific  
3 programs and activities aimed at meeting identified  
4 community health needs.

5 Taken as a whole, Provena Health's  
6 contributions, on average, represented more than  
7 \$511,000 in charitable benefit each and every day.

8 In the greater Danville area, Provena  
9 United Samaritans Medical Center's 2010 charitable  
10 impact represented more than \$16 million, 40 percent  
11 of which, or 6.7 million, was free care at cost, and  
12 46 percent of which, or 7.6 million, represented  
13 combined provisions of care not fully reimbursed from  
14 Medicaid or Medicare. In addition, Provena United  
15 Samaritans contributed over \$2.2 million in community  
16 benefit services and had a combined daily charitable  
17 impact of more than \$45,000, on average, during 2010.

18 These amounts not only represent an  
19 enduring commitment to serve all regardless of their  
20 ability to pay, but also underscore the critical role  
21 Provena ministries play in the communities we serve,  
22 especially during these difficult economic times. We  
23 recognize that among those we serve are often those  
24 most in need. We are privileged to have their trust,

1 and we work daily to ensure we continue to provide  
2 nationally recognized, high-quality care and services  
3 to each and every individual who comes through our  
4 doors.

5 I am pleased to submit into the record  
6 Provena Health's 2010 Report to Our Communities which  
7 details at a much greater level our enduring  
8 commitment to serve all and the charitable impact we  
9 deliver within the communities we serve.

10 As complexities within our nation's health  
11 care system evolve, we are compelled to adapt and  
12 innovate; to preserve, strengthen and grow our  
13 ministry for the benefit of the millions of people in  
14 Illinois who depend upon us for care. And that is why  
15 we seek your approval for our partnership and  
16 collaboration with Resurrection Health Care.

17 Together as Catholic health care  
18 providers, we will embrace the work that lies ahead to  
19 create a health care system that is available and  
20 accessible to everyone; that is health and  
21 prevention-oriented; that rewards quality and not  
22 quantity; that is transparent and consensus-driven;  
23 that is safe; and that is effective and  
24 patient-centered; and that addresses health needs at

1 all stages of life, from conception to natural death.

2 Thank you.

3 MR. ROATE: The State Agency would like to  
4 now call Ms. Gretchen Wesner.

5 MS. WESNER: It's Gretchen,  
6 G-r-e-t-c-h-e-n, Wesner, W-e-s-n-e-r.

7 And I'm simply here to hand in testimony  
8 on behalf of Judith A. Myers, who is the Chairperson  
9 of the Board of Directors for Provena United  
10 Samaritans Medical Center.

11 MR. ROATE: Thank you.

12 Next, the State Agency would like to call  
13 Stephanie Yates.

14 MS. YATES: Stephanie, S-t-e-p-h-a-n-i-e,  
15 Yates, Y-a-t-e-s.

16 And I'm submitting a letter to Ms. Avery.  
17 My letter states:

18 "Dear Ms. Avery:

19 I was born and raised in Danville and  
20 moved to Bismarck, a small town about 12 miles north  
21 of here, nearly 33 years ago. For almost 31 years, I  
22 have worked at Provena United Samaritans Medical  
23 Center.

24 Following a number of years as an LPN,

1 which included work in Intensive Care, Surgery, and  
2 several physician offices, I was given the opportunity  
3 to complete the radiology program in 1981. Since  
4 then, I have worked as a Rad Tech in General, Surgery,  
5 Bone Densitometry, as a Special Procedures Tech,  
6 Clinical Instructor, Quality Assurance Tech, Assistant  
7 Director, Manager, and now Director.

8 I share this with you to demonstrate the  
9 special commitment the organization makes to advancing  
10 the career aspirations of its employees. It is no  
11 wonder Provena United Samaritans is a leading employer  
12 here in Vermilion County.

13 But health care is in the midst of  
14 mind-boggling change. Our hospital needs this merger  
15 to stay strong, grow, and serve. It is a treasured  
16 resource for our community in so many ways -- from  
17 folks who depend on us to care for them to people like  
18 me who benefit from their employment.

19 I respectfully ask the Health Facilities  
20 and Services Review Board to approve our application  
21 to merge with Resurrection Health Center -- or, Health  
22 Care."

23 MR. ROATE: The State Agency would like to  
24 call Mr. Chad Hays.

1 MR. HAYS: Good morning. My name is Chad  
2 Hays, C-h-a-d H-a-y-s. I have the privilege of  
3 serving as the State Representative of the 104th  
4 District, which includes Danville as its largest  
5 community.

6 I've taken a special interest in the  
7 merger between Provena Health and Resurrection Health  
8 for a couple of reasons. One, I am the State  
9 Representative for the 104th District, which includes  
10 Danville. I'm also the former Vice President of  
11 Development of Mission Services and the Chief  
12 Fundraising Officer for Provena United Samaritans  
13 Medical Center where, together with a terrific Board  
14 of Directors and staff, we raised over \$16 million and  
15 coordinated the hospital's numerous award-winning  
16 community outreach efforts, including the HALO  
17 Project, I Sing the Body Electric, Faith in Action,  
18 Faith in Action South, Young Women Aware and Young Men  
19 Aware.

20 I understand keenly the market pressures  
21 health care providers face in these tumultuous  
22 economic times. And I recognize the invaluable role  
23 hospitals like Provena United Samaritans play in the  
24 lives that they serve.

1           This merger seeks to preserve and enhance  
2 access to care for the people of the 104th District.  
3 In doing so, it will also help to provide continued  
4 employment to my former colleagues and constituents.

5           I request the Services and Review Board  
6 approve the Certificate of Need Application Number  
7 11-039.

8           In addition, I would like to provide other  
9 commentary. I happened to be an employee at United  
10 Samaritans Medical Center when we became part of  
11 Provena Health in 1997. And certainly that was not  
12 without some concern in the community. And I think  
13 the evidence has proven out that that was a very, very  
14 positive dynamic for this community.

15           Clinical advances that we could not  
16 possibly have brought to Danville alone were  
17 underwritten because of the participation of Provena  
18 Health -- a new women's health center; cancer center  
19 renovations that are underway as we speak; new labor,  
20 delivery and recovery suites; smartphones; open MRI;  
21 sleep lab; a totally renovated emergency room where 38  
22 to 40,000 of our residents are treated each and every  
23 year, a number that is unheard of in a community of  
24 33,000 people.

1           We live in an era where there is increased  
2 pressure on hospitals, particularly charitable  
3 hospitals, from increasing Medicaid rolls, increasing  
4 pressure from the state to pay less money, despite  
5 having very generous, very generous participation  
6 guidelines. This really is about concentrating  
7 limited resources where the care is needed and being  
8 able to consolidate back-office functions for more  
9 efficiency.

10           It also makes tremendous sense from an  
11 organizational perspective. Provena Health and  
12 Resurrection Health really do share a common mission,  
13 a mission that has been alive and well in this  
14 community for well over 125 years.

15           I give my strongest endorsement to this  
16 merger and I thank you for your time.

17           MR. ROATE: The State Agency would like to  
18 call Deb Schimerowski.

19           MS. SCHIMEROWSKI: My name is Deborah  
20 Schimerowski, D-e-b-o-r-a-h S-c-h-i-m-e-r-o-w-s-k-i.

21           And I'm here just to present written  
22 testimony from Patrick O'Shaughnessy. Do you need me  
23 to spell that? P-a-t-r-i-c-k O'S-h-a-u-g-h-n-e-s-s-y.  
24 He's a local business owner with Vermilion County

1 Title, Inc.

2 MR. ROATE: Thank you.

3 Next, the State Agency would like to call  
4 Dr. Gopinath.

5 DR. GOPINATH: Good morning, everybody.

6 Well, before I read the letter from Dr.  
7 Naveed Sadiq, who is the Vice President of Medical  
8 Staff and also on the Board of Directors, I would like  
9 to tell you about myself.

10 I am the Chief Medical Officer of Provena  
11 United Samaritans Medical Center. And also, I was a  
12 resident of Resurrection Health Care, which was  
13 previously Catholic Health Partners. So I'm very  
14 supportive of this merger.

15 Because as a resident I learned about  
16 patient-centeredness, I learned about patient safety,  
17 I learned about compassion, and I learned about  
18 customer service as an internal medicine resident.  
19 I'm an internist by training. So all the three years  
20 I learned and I come here as an administrator, I see  
21 that on an everyday basis.

22 And when I see these two coming together,  
23 I see two families coming together. And I have always  
24 learned that when it is this (gesturing) compared to

1 this (gesturing), and I see a fist coming together,  
2 two systems coming together in this era of health care  
3 reform. So I'm very supportive from my aspect for  
4 this merger.

5 Having said that, let me read the letter  
6 from Dr. Naveed Sadiq. This is addressed to  
7 Ms. Courtney Avery, Administrator, Illinois Health  
8 Facilities and Services Review Board, regarding the  
9 merger of Provena Health and Resurrection Health Care  
10 Corporation.

11 "Dear Ms. Avery:

12 As vice president of the medical staff of  
13 Provena United Samaritans Medical Center as well as a  
14 member of the Board of Directors of the Medical  
15 Center, I ask the approval of the Illinois Health  
16 Facilities and Services Review Board on the merger of  
17 Provena Health and Resurrection Health Care.

18 The medical community in Danville has long  
19 been committed to serving the diverse needs of the  
20 people here. Our goal is always to provide the best  
21 possible treatment, close to home.

22 Thanks to the collaborative efforts with  
23 the administrators of Provena United Samaritans, we  
24 have been able to bring new programs and services to

1 the hospital in recent years, backed by the  
2 exceptional expertise of a number of physicians.  
3 Today, our hospital offers much that patients used to  
4 have to travel for, including minimally invasive  
5 procedures for heartburn, treatment of varicose veins,  
6 critical care and pulmonary medicine and leading-edge  
7 cancer treatment and women's health programs that  
8 rival many found in big cities.

9 We are confident this merger will benefit  
10 the hospital in a manner which will allow us to  
11 continue to expand our offerings, attract medical  
12 specialists, and above all, care for the people where  
13 they live.

14 Thank you for your consideration.

17 MR. ROATE: The State Agency would like to  
18 call Cathy Emanuel.

19 MS. EMANUEL: I'm Cathy, C-a-t-h-y,  
20 Emanuel, E-m-a-n-u-e-l. And I'm submitting written  
21 testimony on behalf of Jeanne Mulvaney, President of  
22 the United Way, in support of the project.

23 MR. ROATE: Thank you.

24 Is there anyone who wishes to testify who

1 has not had an opportunity?

2 MS. LAGGER: I would like to submit into  
3 the record two additional letters at this point.

4 MR. ROATE: By all means.

5 Seeing none, is there anyone who has  
6 testified who wishes to provide additional testimony?

7 (No response)

8 MR. ROATE: I would remind everyone to  
9 submit your written comments to us so that we may have  
10 this information for the record. Also, the project is  
11 scheduled for consideration by the Illinois Health  
12 Facilities and Services Review Board at its October  
13 12th-13th, 2011, meeting. This meeting will be held  
14 in Joliet at the Holiday Inn Hotel and Conference  
15 Center, 411 South Larkin Avenue, Joliet, Illinois.
