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1 MR. BAUMANN: Call the meeting to order.
2 Let's stand for the Pledge of Allegiance.
3 Can we have a moment of silence for all our
4 veterans out there, those who have lost their
5 lives for our country, those who are still
6 fighting for our country.
7 (Pledge of Allegiance
8 Moment of silence.)
9 MR. BAUMANN: Has everybody read the minutes
10 from September 18th? Do I have a motion to
11 accept?
12 MR. CHRISTENSEN: So moved.
13 MR. HUNT: Second.
14 MR. BAUMANN: All those in favor say aye.
15 (A chorus of ayes.)
16 MR. BAUMANN: All those opposed?
17 (No response.)
18 MR. BAUMANN: Business with Mr. Robert
19 Capuani, the Director, his report.
20 MR. CAPUANI: Okay. Total number of
21 conveyances registered, 34,336; 20,479 locations;
22 permits totaling this year, 114; licenses, 525;
23 83 registrations; and 1,749 certificates.
24 MR. BAUMANN: Is that it?

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1 MR. CAPUANI: That's it.
2 MR. BAUMANN: Moving on to new business. Any
3 other old business? Moving on to new business.
4 We have a presentation from Elevator World for
5 continuing education approval.
6 MR. O'GUINN: Yes.
7 MR. BAUMANN: Good morning. Could you please
8 state your name for the reporter, and spell it for
9 her?
10 MR. O'GUINN: My name is Brad, B-R-A-D,
11 O-'-G-U-Y-N-N.
12 MR. BAUMANN: Good morning.
13 MR. O'GUINN: Good morning. I am
14 vice-president of sales market for Elevator World.
15 First, I would like to thank you for
16 having us here today. We are here to give you a
17 general overview of our continuing education
18 program, and to consider us for approval.
19 Caleb Givens is the gentleman here, he's
20 head of our continuing education program, he's
21 going to hand you out a packet. In the packet,
22 you will receive a general overview of the
23 program, as well as a certificate of completion
24 that a candidate will get once they pass one of

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1 our exams, and then also an individual syllabi for
2 each continuing education course that we provide.
3 Currently, we are approved in 14 states
4 currently for CET and CAT approved by NAEC, and
5 also QEI approved by NAESAI. We also administer
6 the certificate of competency exam for the State
7 of Florida.
8 I've been kind of walking through the
9 process that the candidate would experience when
10 they're taking one or more of our exams, and Caleb
11 is going to talk to you a little bit about each
12 course topic which covers safety, maintenance,
13 technical articles, and things of that nature.
14 I am sure each of you know Elevator World
15 pretty well. I just want to mention a few things
16 about Elevator World. This January we just
17 celebrated 62 years in the elevator industry. We
18 publish four industry magazines. We provide nine
19 industry-related websites. We also publish in
20 retail over 200 educational books, videos, DVDs,
21 software that are on topics such as maintenance,
22 safety, training materials, engineering. We also
23 provide almost one hundred continuing education
24 courses.

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<p style="text-align: right;">Page 5</p> <p>1 I do understand that the State of 2 Illinois does require two hours of code update for 3 continuing education. Currently, Elevator World 4 does not provide code update course in continuing 5 education. So today, we are going to ask that you 6 please consider accepting us for six hours, 7 contact hours for approval. 8 I do want to mention that Elevator World 9 attends every ASME code update seminar during the 10 year. We cover editorial for our magazine. So I 11 feel confident in the future that we can produce 12 this two hour continuing education course. I 13 would like to work with you in the future when we 14 do get that available. I just wanted to mention 15 that. 16 Our continuing education courses are 17 based on both printed material and also DVD 18 presentations. These presentations are given and 19 written by industry experts and professionals, 20 such as John Koshak, George Gibson, Zack McCain, 21 and other well-known people in the industry. 22 When a candidate is ready to take one of 23 our exams, basically what they would do is, they 24 would either call us or go to our online book</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 7</p> <p>1 a large pool of questions. So, for instance, if 2 it's a 50-question exam, it may be 200, 250 3 questions, and it's automatically pulled from that 4 pool. So if a person is taking an exam, and they 5 fail it, and they have to retake it, the chances 6 of them getting the same questions is very rare. 7 They probably will not get the same questions. 8 The candidate -- also very important is 9 the candidate cannot take the same course within 10 the same calendar year. So if I take the 11 Hydraulic Elevator Maintenance Course today, 12 March 5th, I am not eligible to take this again 13 until March 6, 2016. 14 A passing score of 80 percent or above is 15 required. If a person passes this exam, then they 16 will automatically be able to print up a 17 certificate of completion, which you have 18 immediately, and they can either e-mail this to 19 the state, or mail it in if that's what you 20 require. 21 If they fail it, if they score below 80 22 percent, basically they will have to -- they will 23 get one free retake on this exam. If they fail 24 the second retake, they will have to purchase the</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 6</p> <p>1 store and purchase the exam at elevatorbooks.com. 2 If you are an Elevator World Magazine subscriber 3 currently, you will receive a 15 percent discount 4 on our courses, as well as the learning materials 5 that the exam is from. 6 Once those courses have been purchased, 7 what we do is we send the candidate an e-mail with 8 a user name and password. They would use this to 9 log on to take the exam. The exam is taken online 10 at Exambuilder.com, that's our current software 11 provider. Each course is timed, and basically 12 they have a certain amount of time limit to take 13 it. If it's, say, eight questions, they may have 14 90 minutes to take the exam. If it's 20 15 questions, they may have 30 minutes, or 45 16 minutes. So it can vary depending upon the number 17 of contact hours. 18 Very important is, the person, when they 19 go in to take the exam, as soon as they log on, 20 they have to take it within the required amount of 21 time. They can't log in and log back out. If 22 they do, it's automatically a failing grade. 23 The exam questions are true-false, 24 multiple choice, and they are pulled randomly from</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 8</p> <p>1 exam again and they have to wait two weeks. The 2 reason we make them wait two weeks is because, 3 obviously, they didn't study the material, or 4 they're not familiar with it, so that will give 5 them ample time to study the course again. 6 We do keep a database of all persons who 7 take this exam. We keep them both -- we keep the 8 certificates, the date they took the course, and 9 also the course that was taken. We keep it on 10 file for a minimum of seven years. That's 11 required. We keep both the physical copy in our 12 office and we also keep an Illinois backup that is 13 hosted by our software provider Exambuilder.com. 14 As you can see, the certificate itself, 15 that's just a general certificate. If the state 16 does not require any customization to that 17 certificate, that's what a person will receive. 18 We do have several states that require it to have 19 the person's state license number, their logo on 20 it, we can customize it to whatever you would like 21 to be appropriate. 22 As I mentioned, currently we are using 23 Exambuilder.com for our testing provider. We are 24 actually going to be switching it in a couple of</p>

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<p style="text-align: right;">Page 9</p> <p>1 months, two or three months, to a new software 2 provider. The reason for that is that this new 3 provider will offer us better upgrades in the near 4 future for -- the future of our continuing 5 education programs. 6 One of those important upgrades is the 7 verification process, and I know that's probably 8 what you are asking, well, the person that is 9 taking the exam, how do you know that's the person 10 taking it if it's online. They have many options. 11 One of those is if a person is taking the exam and 12 it's a 50-question exam, we can enter a 13 non-scorable question within the exam that will 14 ask them something that's unique to them that they 15 can fill in, such as their state certification 16 number. So not only is it timed, but if it's not 17 them taking the test, they probably don't know 18 their buddy's state certification number, or their 19 mother's maiden name, or whatever you might 20 require it to be. So we will be able to do that. 21 In addition, we also like to tell states 22 that in addition to the verification processes 23 that we can provide, you as a state can also 24 request that a technician, when they are taking</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 11</p> <p>1 any problems with anyone taking the exam, or by 2 the approved provider. 3 Many different states have requirements 4 on how we issue certificates. Some require us to 5 issue rosters if you take the exam every month. 6 They also require us to send certain 7 documentation. Whatever you guys decide, we can 8 abide by those requirements and make that happen. 9 We already work with 14 other states, so we are 10 familiar with what people want. Some require it 11 to be filed electronically. Some just want a 12 roster in an Excel file spreadsheet. We can 13 certainly handle whatever what you require for 14 this. 15 I am going to let Caleb come up and 16 generally go through some of the topics of the 17 courses, and who those are written by and what 18 they entail. 19 If you have any questions for me now, I 20 am more than happy to answer them. 21 MR. BAUMANN: Any questions? 22 MR. HERTSBERG: When did you go live to this 23 program? 24 MR. O'GUYN: We've had it since 2006. We've</p>
<p style="text-align: right;">Page 10</p> <p>1 the exam, they must be proctored on site by one of 2 their supervisors. That is available if you want 3 to do that. 4 We feel that the real beauty of 5 self-study online exams is that the person taking 6 the exam does not have to miss any time off work, 7 it's available to them 24/7 taken at their 8 convenience. 9 Additionally, as you will hear from 10 Caleb, our courses are based on very important 11 topics that spread a broad segment of what an 12 inspector or mechanical, you know, face on a daily 13 basis, such as maintenance and modernization, 14 elevator testing procedures, inspections, safety 15 to governors, BF drives, a wide topic of things 16 that we've all heard. 17 The main thing that we like to say is 18 that it does teach them how to do the job. It 19 teaches them how to do it the right way. More 20 importantly, it teaches them how to do it safely. 21 So this is kind of an overview of what a person 22 would experience by taking the exam. 23 We give between 1500 and 2,000 tests that 24 go through our system every year. We don't have</p>	<p style="text-align: right;">Page 12</p> <p>1 been offering this since 2006. We've been with 2 the same software provider since 2006, and it's 3 been great, we've had no problems. We do see 4 states that are slowly asking us to come up with 5 better verification processes, and that's what we 6 are doing. 7 Just to let you know, another thing we 8 can do is if a person logs onto the exam, we can 9 automatically make them change their user name to 10 something unique to them, such as their state 11 license number. There's many things we can do now 12 to help with the verification process. That's one 13 reason why we are kind of moving along to better 14 upgrades on the system. We've been doing this for 15 a long time. 16 MR. SHANKLIN: So the program, it's good for 17 six hours, is that what we are talking about? 18 MR. O'GUYN: Well, I mean, technically 19 anybody can get eight hours. 20 MR. SHANKLIN: You are credited for six hours, 21 though? 22 MR. O'GUYN: We don't do code updates. We 23 would only be eligible for six hours to you, but 24 somebody can come in and get eight hours from us</p>

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1 if they don't require code updates.
2 MR. SHANKLIN: And that would be a combination
3 of --
4 MR. O'GUYN: Any of those exams.
5 MR. SHANKLIN: -- any of those exam criteria?
6 MR. O'GUYN: We have anything from
7 article-based continuing education, which is
8 written by, you know, CEOs, expert consultants,
9 engineers, to maintenance written by Zack McCain,
10 to Rope Traction written by expert George Gibson,
11 it's a DVD presentation that he gives a lot of the
12 courses across the U.S. That's what Caleb is
13 going to talk about.
14 MR. SHANKLIN: So what limits you to six
15 hours?
16 MR. O'GUYN: Well, it doesn't. I am just
17 saying six hours for the State of Illinois because
18 we don't do code update. So we can only be
19 approved for six hours, that's what I understand.
20 MR. CAPUANI: This program would only be
21 approved for six hours?
22 MR. O'GUYN: Right.
23 MR. CAPUANI: No matter if they took 10 hours
24 or whatever?

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1 MR. O'GUYN: Right. That's what I am trying
2 to say. We only approve it for six. He would
3 need another certificate for code update.
4 MR. SHANKLIN: Thank you.
5 MR. GREGORY: This is just commenting on
6 yours. You might get 20 hours here, but from our
7 point -- from the State of Illinois point of view,
8 you can have 20 hours of all kinds of good stuff,
9 but if you don't have the two hours of safety, you
10 haven't cut the mustard.
11 MR. O'GUYN: And we do have companies that
12 come in, like our educational focus course topics,
13 which are on technical topics, door operators,
14 freight doors, you can get a total of 21 hours
15 from that one course, and a lot of companies will
16 buy that 21 hours and use it for several
17 technicians. You know, they get their eight
18 hours.
19 MR. HERTSBERG: What precluded you from doing
20 the code updates?
21 MR. O'GUYN: No one is required except for
22 the State of Illinois currently. The State of
23 Florida did require for us, like I mentioned, we
24 also administer their state certificate of

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1 competency, which a person has to pass before they
2 can be in CET safety or licensed in Florida. They
3 did require us to put code updates in that
4 certificate of competency. So we went ahead and
5 did it. They asked us to do it and we did it.
6 That's what I am saying, for Illinois we
7 can do the same thing. So now that we know that
8 you require us to do that, we can do that.
9 Like I say, we cover every ASME meeting.
10 We have two people there all the time. So we
11 wouldn't have any problem writing that code
12 update. I feel like we can do that in a couple of
13 months.
14 MR. HERTSBERG: I would strongly suggest that.
15 The State of Illinois requires eight hours.
16 MR. O'GUYN: Yes, now that we know that you
17 do require it.
18 MR. SHANKLIN: It's a waste of time.
19 MR. GREGORY: It's not a waste of time.
20 MR. BAUMANN: You still need the two hours.
21 MR. O'GUYN: They can get six hours from us
22 and they can get two hours from anywhere else that
23 offers the updates.
24 MR. HERTSBERG: Then a person can go somewhere

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1 else and do it.
2 MR. O'GUYN: Yes, but at least they have
3 another option. They won't have to miss a day on
4 the job. They can take this at work. They can
5 take it at home. A company is not losing money
6 with somebody being off the job site. That's a
7 real advantage of this program.
8 Like I said, you know, we've been
9 approved by 14 other states and we have four other
10 states right now that we have in front of us, and we
11 are slowly moving forward to that.
12 MR. HERTSBERG: Were there any other states
13 that did not accept the code program?
14 MR. O'GUYN: No, only the states that do not
15 require continuing education. We have not had any
16 states that have turned us down. We have four
17 states that we have in front of us now, such as
18 Utah, Colorado, they typically just take it to the
19 Board and decide it, but we've had nobody turn the
20 program down that we've put in front of them.
21 The material is great material.
22 Obviously, like I told you, you know, we've been
23 in business for 62 years. We don't put stuff out
24 there that's not good stuff. People learn from

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1 what they read and what they comprehend. If they
 2 don't, they won't pass the test.
 3 MR. BAUMANN: Any further questions from the
 4 Board? Do you want your partner to come up?
 5 MR. O'GUINN: Yes, he's going to tell you a
 6 little bit about different course topics.
 7 MR. BAUMANN: Good morning. Can you please
 8 tell us your name and spell it?
 9 MR. GIVENS: Caleb Givens. C-A-L-E-B
 10 G-I-V-E-N-S.
 11 Thank you again for having us.
 12 So like Brad said, I just want to briefly
 13 go over the course categories, it's in detailed
 14 information in the packet, but I will just go
 15 over, you know, briefly what each category is and
 16 the materials that the candidate would use to
 17 study.
 18 So the first is our Article-Based
 19 Continuing Education, which he did mention. These
 20 are based on technical articles that we publish in
 21 Elevator World Magazine. They are written by
 22 industry professionals. We also follow the
 23 guidelines from the International Association of
 24 Continuing Education and Training to determine the

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1 number of questions and the possible credit hours
 2 for those articles, which the articles range from
 3 one to three.
 4 Next is the Educational Focus Series,
 5 which, as he said, is 21 contact hours, that you
 6 can, like he said, buy for multiple people, and
 7 they cover, again, multiple topics, and these are
 8 a compilation of 55 articles, topics such as door
 9 operators, dispatching systems, guide rails,
 10 safeties and governors, and also escalators. The
 11 individual courses can also be purchased and taken
 12 for one to three contact hours. Included with
 13 this is an educational focus guide, and this
 14 contains article objectives, study questions as
 15 well as learning re-enforcement questions, and we
 16 do have sample material here if anyone would like
 17 to see it, I can get it.
 18 MR. O'GUINN: We actually have the questions
 19 from the exams if you would like to review them,
 20 also the learning materials for that.
 21 MR. GIVENS: Next is going to be our
 22 Maintenance Category, and there's three options
 23 with this. The first is Elevator and Escalator
 24 Maintenance Course, which is based on Zack

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1 McCain's Elevator Maintenance Manual, which is an
 2 in depth guide designed for the service
 3 technician. It covers maintenance programs and
 4 practices for both electric and hydraulic
 5 elevators, as well as escalators and moving walls.
 6 The entire series is worth 11-and-a-half,
 7 or they can take the individual courses which
 8 range from one-and-a-half to four-and-a-half each.
 9 The second in the Maintenance Series is
 10 the Maintenance Control Program and MRL Elevator
 11 Inspections. This is a 94-minute DVD. We also
 12 brought the DVDs with us. It's also by John
 13 Koshak. It provides an in depth look at details
 14 about the MCP, such as code requirements, legacy
 15 equipment versus MRLs, as well as practices for
 16 the monthly fire safety test. This one is worth
 17 one-and-a-half hours.
 18 The third in the Maintenance is
 19 Maintenance on New Equipment Designs, which is
 20 based on John Koshak's book by the same title.
 21 This course provides a clear explanation of the
 22 differences new technology is making to
 23 maintenance. The series is separated in two
 24 courses for three or six contact hours each, or

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1 again you can choose to take the total course for
 2 nine hours.
 3 Safety is obviously the number one
 4 priority in our industry, and in the next six to
 5 eight weeks we are launching the 2015 Safety
 6 Handbook, which I'm sure you're all familiar with.
 7 We have the current version, the 2010, with us
 8 today.
 9 So our safety courses are always based
 10 off the most recent version of this handbook. The
 11 entire series is worth three-and-a-half of the
 12 safety courses, or you can choose to take one or
 13 all of the four individual exams for one contact
 14 hour each.
 15 Next is the Field Employees Elevator
 16 Testing Course. This is based on the Third
 17 Edition of the Elevator Testing Manual. This
 18 manual is written by Elevator World in conjunction
 19 with NAESA International and Zack McCain &
 20 Associates. This handbook is designed to provide
 21 a guide to anyone performing various tests on
 22 elevators in front of a QEI. It helps understand
 23 what is being tested and why, and also a safe
 24 means to demonstrate function. This course is

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1 worth three contact hours.
 2 The final category is our Ropes category.
 3 We have two options here. The first is Rope
 4 Dynamics. This is a 40-minute DVD. It's written
 5 by Dr. Stefan Kaczmarczyk and Phil Andrew. It
 6 discusses the purpose of analyzing the dynamic
 7 behavior of the roping system. This particular
 8 one is worth one contact hour.
 9 The final one in the Ropes course is Rope
 10 Traction Theory & Practice. It's also a DVD, it's
 11 110 minutes in length, and it's a seminar
 12 presented by George Gibson who, as you know, is
 13 the leading expert in this field. This covers the
 14 basics of rope traction and also provides a
 15 working knowledge of its principals, and is worth
 16 three contact hours.
 17 So again, that should give you just a
 18 general overview of our categories, the material,
 19 and Brad has gone over how a student would -- a
 20 candidate would take the exam.
 21 So again, if there are any questions
 22 after hearing that, we would be happy to answer
 23 them.
 24 MR. BAUMANN: Any questions for Caleb from the

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1 Board?
 2 MR. HUNT: Just one from me. There's
 3 currently the NEEP program. How is your program
 4 better than -- or what's the benefits to your
 5 program versus the NEEP type program?
 6 MR. GIVENS: NEEP also does online
 7 communications. Is that what you're asking me, as
 8 far as the differences?
 9 MR. HUNT: Well, differences, not just so much
 10 the online portion. Is there a breadth of course
 11 difference? With the advent of the Internet,
 12 everybody can put something online. Are the
 13 courses similar? Are they different? Less?
 14 More? I was just kind of paging through the NEEP
 15 program guide, just under "Continuing Education"
 16 in small print on this thing. But depth-wise
 17 versus -- I'm just trying to get an idea of how
 18 your program comparison-wise is the same as or
 19 better than -- in what areas than the current NEEP
 20 program?
 21 MR. O'GUINN: I think it's pretty similar. I
 22 don't really want to say that, you know, we don't
 23 just put anything online, you know. I can't
 24 stress enough we've been around for 62 years.

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1 We've worked with some of the best experts in the
 2 field. So I strongly feel that our continuing
 3 education is as good as or better than anybody
 4 else.
 5 MR. HUNT: What makes yours different and
 6 better than the NEEP program?
 7 MR. BAUMANN: May I interrupt? They are not
 8 asking about the difference between the program,
 9 they are asking about the continuing education
 10 portion of it. So it's not the program itself,
 11 it's not the apprenticeship program. It's the
 12 continuing education.
 13 MR. HUNT: Just the continuing education?
 14 MR. O'GUINN: Yes. Not the actual program.
 15 We are just here for the continuing ed portion.
 16 MR. BAUMANN: I know what you are referencing.
 17 MR. HUNT: I got confused, forgive me.
 18 MR. BAUMANN: You are referencing off the Act.
 19 MR. HUNT: Sorry.
 20 MR. O'GUINN: That's okay.
 21 MR. HERTSBERG: I am reading, six hours would
 22 cost the person about 130 bucks, correct?
 23 MR. O'GUINN: I would have to add it up, just
 24 depending on what you take. If you are a

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1 subscriber, you do get a discount, it would be
 2 between 25. It would vary if you are a subscriber
 3 or not. I think that's actually a real good deal.
 4 They are not off the job.
 5 MR. HERTSBERG: Well, as a member of the
 6 union, they don't have to pay anything.
 7 MR. O'GUINN: Yes, but you have to have an
 8 option for other people as well.
 9 MR. HERTSBERG: Right.
 10 MR. BAUMANN: Any further questions from the
 11 Board?
 12 Do I have a motion to accept the six
 13 hours?
 14 MR. SHANKLIN: I make a motion to accept the
 15 six hours.
 16 MR. OTTEN: Second.
 17 MR. BAUMANN: No question on the motion.
 18 Moved and seconded.
 19 All those in favor say aye.
 20 (A chorus of ayes.)
 21 All those opposed?
 22 (No response.)
 23 MR. BAUMANN: You guys have it.
 24 MR. O'GUINN: Thank you so much.

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1 MR. BAUMANN: You understand that if you have
 2 to change it or alter it, get those two hours
 3 extra, that you will have to come in front of the
 4 Board?
 5 MR. O'GUYN: We can do that. I think we
 6 could, definitely, like I said, since we go to the
 7 code update meetings, we would have no problem.
 8 MR. BAUMANN: You are approved for the six
 9 hours, not the two hours total update.
 10 MR. O'GUYN: Right.
 11 Would I need to follow up with you,
 12 Mr. Capuani, if you require anything special for
 13 the certificate, or do we need to send in a
 14 roster?
 15 MR. CAPUANI: I will talk to you.
 16 MR. O'GUYN: Okay, I will follow up with you.
 17 Thank you very much.
 18 MR. BAUMANN: Thank you for coming up.
 19 Moving on to the next agenda item is
 20 QEITF presentation for continuing education.
 21 If you wouldn't mind spelling your
 22 name -- saying your name and spelling it for the
 23 court reporter.
 24 MR. MORAND: It's Mike, or Michael,

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1 M-I-C-H-A-E-L, Morand, M-O-R-A-N-D, and I am with
 2 the Elevator Industry Work Preservation Fund.
 3 Good morning. Thanks for having us.
 4 Basically, I want to explain to you that
 5 the Elevator Industry Work Preservation Fund has
 6 been doing training, certification, and continuing
 7 education for elevator inspectors since 1997.
 8 Since 2005, the Elevator Industry Work
 9 Preservation Fund became accredited to certify
 10 elevator inspectors and provide continuing
 11 education to them.
 12 Since 2014, ASME no longer accredited
 13 certifying organizations. So the Elevator
 14 Industry Work Preservation Fund QEI had to change
 15 our name to the Qualified Elevator Inspector
 16 Training Fund once we sought accreditation through
 17 ANSI for the QEI-1 inspectors.
 18 We still provide continuing education to
 19 those inspectors, eight hours of contact in the
 20 classroom environment, and a two-hour exam online
 21 for our inspectors.
 22 I am here because we've got mechanics in
 23 the Illinois area that have their mechanics
 24 license who attend our classes, and in the past

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1 they have provided proof of their QEI training,
 2 and code update, and safety information to the
 3 Board to renew their mechanics license, and I
 4 guess the name change from EIWPF to QEITF didn't
 5 follow along. So I am here to ask that QEITF be
 6 considered as a continuing education provider for
 7 the mechanics.
 8 MR. GREGORY: And inspectors?
 9 MR. MORAND: And inspectors.
 10 MR. GREGORY: Okay.
 11 MR. BAUMANN: I believe the inspectors are
 12 already approved in this, right, and the mechanics
 13 themselves have not? So that's the reason why
 14 they are doing that.
 15 MR. GREGORY: Okay.
 16 MR. MORAND: Some mechanics hold QEI
 17 credential as well.
 18 MR. BAUMANN: Any questions from the Board?
 19 MR. ADAMS: Just for clarification, this is
 20 just clarification, nomenclature, purely
 21 nomenclature, correct? What you are calling QEITF
 22 is just purely a name change?
 23 MR. MORAND: Yes, sir.
 24 MR. ADAMS: Nothing else has changed?

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1 MR. MORAND: Yes, sir.
 2 MR. CAPUANI: This Board already approved the
 3 program prior to them changing the name.
 4 MR. ADAMS: Okay.
 5 MR. BAUMANN: No further questions?
 6 MR. SHANKLIN: Mr. Chairman, I may have to
 7 abstain from the vote. I will have to abstain
 8 from the vote on my relationship with the QEITF.
 9 MR. CAPUANI: Then, yes, abstain. I was
 10 worried about the quorum if you didn't vote.
 11 With Terry Shanklin abstaining from the
 12 vote, all the remaining Board members voting, do I
 13 have a motion?
 14 MR. CHRISTENSEN: Motion to accept.
 15 MR. DATTILO: Second.
 16 MR. BAUMANN: Any questions on the motion? No
 17 questions.
 18 All those in favor say aye.
 19 (A chorus of ayes.)
 20 All those opposed?
 21 (No response.)
 22 MR. BAUMANN: The ayes have it unanimously.
 23 MR. MORAND: Thank you, ladies and gentlemen.
 24 MR. BAUMANN: Thank you, Mr. Morand.

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1 Moving on to new business, the Board will
 2 hear from New Technology Pneumatic Vacuum
 3 Elevators.
 4 Do we have a representative from
 5 Pneumatic Vacuum Elevators? No one is speaking on
 6 it?
 7 MR. SHANKLIN: Pretty short-winded.
 8 MR. GREGORY: A Hoover elevator or an
 9 Electrolux elevator.
 10 MR. BAUMANN: No, that's like the banking
 11 tubes that go back and forth. So that's pneumatic
 12 elevators.
 13 Seeing how no one is here, we can't
 14 discuss it. Do I have a motion to table? Do I
 15 have a motion?
 16 MR. CHRISTENSEN: Motion to table.
 17 MR. SHANKLIN: Second.
 18 MR. BAUMANN: Moving on to public comment.
 19 The one person that I have here is Miss Patty
 20 Young. Would you like to speak?
 21 MS. YOUNG: At this time I do not, but if
 22 somebody else has public comment, I would like to
 23 have the opportunity.
 24 MR. BAUMANN: You are the only one.

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1 We have no variances or appeals.
 2 Before we close -- before we make an
 3 adjournment, I would like to, this has been --
 4 2015 has been a very tough year so far. Down in
 5 Florida there was a 12-year-old child that was
 6 crushed by an elevator in a residential lift. He
 7 was looking for a hamster. It's a sad state. We
 8 had it out in New York. We've lost an electrician
 9 working on an elevator. We had a serious injury
 10 in California.
 11 I want to remind the Board this is the
 12 reason why we are here, for the safety of the
 13 general public, and I just want to bring it to
 14 your attention that it's happening throughout the
 15 country. So I want to thank you for being here,
 16 for doing this, and I know it's taking your time
 17 out, I just want to bring it to your attention.
 18 Bob.
 19 MR. CAPUANI: I will be your contact for now,
 20 so have patience with me. I will try to do the
 21 best I can with travel, but I will be your contact
 22 person for now.
 23 MR. BAUMANN: Any questions?
 24 Do we have a motion to adjourn?

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1 MR. CHRISTENSEN: Motion to adjourn.
 2 MR. HUNT: Second.
 3 MR. BAUMANN: Thanks for coming out.
 4 (The Elevator Safety Review Board Meeting
 5 concluded at 9:15 a.m.)
